## INTRODUCTORY NOTE

The Mycenaean bibliography of the Eirene Countries, 1953—1966, has been intended as an attempt at surveying the Mycenological research hitherto performed in these countries, in order to register even the least known contributions dealing with Mycenological questions, which may have passed unnoticed until now.<sup>1</sup>) The author has been fully aware of the difficulties connected with the realization of this task. A number of contributions may have escaped his attention. Several articles quoted here may be regarded as dealing with the Mycenological questions only indirectly, and also some other defects may be probably discovered in this bibliographical list. But even in this form, he believes, such a report may be found a useful aid in the hands of Mycenologists.

The accomplishment of this bibliography would undoubtedly be impossible without the continuous help of a number of scholars from the Eirene countries. And for this reason the author has to express here his sincere thanks especially to I. Fischer, Bucharest, Z. Gansiniec, Cracow, H. Geiss, Berlin, V. Georgiev, Sofia, N. S. Grinbaum, Kishinew, M. D. Petruševski, Skopje, and I. Tegyej, Debrecen, for their readiness to supply him with all information needed.
